

b. Zion Lutheran Church, Hanska

- i. Discussion was held on possibly working with Zion Lutheran, Hanska. Zion Lutheran approached us about the possibility of providing pastoral coverage of their congregation. Several conversations have been held and those working on it seeing the strengths outweighing the concerns. Bob Gruenhagen reviewed Zion's last five years of financials and they are in good shape. Discussion on cost, the need for help on Wednesdays, and other details that would need to be worked out was held.
- ii. Motion was made by Jim Schmidt for the council to appoint a committee to work with Zion and formally present a report in June. Seconded by Bob Gruenhagen. Motion passed.

12. **Budget** – OSLC Treasurer Jessica Olson

 - i. We met our revenue and building fund budgets, and have a surplus in the building fund of \$16,000. There is a loss in the income budget of \$15,000. We had some unexpected costs such as the 75th anniversary, repairs, and closing Kikatiti as it moved to its own non-profit.

b. 2023 Budget

i. The 2023 budget is a \$50,000 increase over 2022. There is nothing else extra in the budget. It includes a 5% increase for staff, and \$3,000 to refurbish our handbells.

 - ii. Brenda Paulson said if the pastors are okay with doing two services on Sunday, we should keep them.
 - iii. John Ingebritson said more people are together at one time with only one service.
 - iv. Annette Haynes likes the opportunity to attend at different times. She has also learned in her work that if you drop something, it is hard to get it back, and we could lose money.
 - v. Deb Egeland noted with the current attendance size, people noticed them as visitors and she appreciated being welcomed.
 - vi. Discussion will be brought to Church Council.
- 15. **Announcements** Jim Schmidt talked about shortage of ushers and volunteers.
 - a. A discussion was held on ideas for strengthening our volunteer core. Marlene Ingebritson suggested offering training. Brenda Ruch and Jayne Hulke felt people need to be personally asked. Jenny Krosch said Deacons have discussed this, and agreed that people don't know how to do the jobs. She suggested we make videos to have online for people to see how to do serving, ushering, etc.

Acts 2:46-47 Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the good-will of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

The theme for our Fall stewardship campaign was, "Because of You, Our Church Changes Lives." You, a beloved child of God, are sharing your gifts in this congregation, and lives are being changed with the Good News of Jesus Christ. You may doubt you have much impact, or you may wonder if we should be humbler, or you may wonder if lives are being changed. These verses from Acts about the early church reassure us that in the day-by-day things we do in the ministries of this church, God is at work. God uses us to change lives.

As I look back on 2023, it is the things that are at the heart of who we are as the people of God that stand out. Weekly worship around Word and Sacrament continues to nourish us to serve God and God's people in the world. Not only do pastors lead this, but choirs, worship volunteers, and deacons all add to this important time as we join together in worship and praise. I am grateful for those who volunteer to make sure our worship is also online for those who cannot be here.

While faith formation is different today with Wednesday and Sunday LinC†, it is an important way we keep promises we make to parents and children at baptism. At LinC† is where I have heard from our kids: A fifth grader: "I love church!" A sixth grader: "Wednesday is my favorite day of the week." A kindergartener: "This God's church!" A sixth grader: "Having faith means I have purpose, a reason to be here." Confirmation looks more traditional, but we make changes to fit today's world. If you were here on Confirmation Sunday you hear this from the faith stories of our 10th grade students. In describing a favorite story being David and Goliath a student said: "The odds were against David and he shocks the world. No matter how little or how belittled you are, you can overcome." You see, as we continue our day-to-day ministries, God is changing lives through this church.

Senior Pastor's Report, continued

While the people on ministry teams rotate, the mission and ministry continue. As an example, the mission team, with your gifts, has been able to designate gifts for many local ministries like NUMAS Haus and Ivy House, along with ELCA hunger and relief ministries. They have been able help parents in our community and needy students at school. Each ministry team has a role and continues to live that out so that our church can continue its ministries. You can read their reports to see what each team has done in 2023. Thanks to all the team and committee members, church council, and church officers for their time and work.

There is much that goes on behind the scenes at church. A few things our volunteers do: count offering, make and serve Wednesday meals, quilt, knit, help at worship, teach, pray, sing, help with funeral meals, clean, decorate, help with mailings, trim trees...I know I'm missing things as there are too many things to list! These day-to-day and week-to-week things are what make the church work, and this is how God uses us to change lives. Thank you!

We gave thanks for the ministry of Shannon Stuckey in 2023, and are grateful for how we have been able to re-shape that position. We welcome Tom Maidl and Sarah Berger to our music staff, and are grateful for how Madeline Cacciatore-Warta has added the Children's Choir to her position. We also thanked Caryn Nelsen for her ministry here and welcome Lois Aufderheide as the new Business Administrator. Thank you to Pastor Dave Nissen, Scott Kathman, Lindsay Medina, and Jen Geiger for their ongoing leadership as the staff of Our Savior's. Day-to-day they live out their callings here and God is using them to help lead our ministries so that we better live out mission.

This was a good year for Our Savior's. We had many baptisms, new members, and worship attendance has grown. At the same time, we held funerals for, or remember, 13 of our members who died. We find comfort in knowing they are with God, yet they were loved and are missed.

Financially, we ended the year strong. While we make inroads on our building debt, getting this paid off is important as there are other needs for our building and parking lot. Thank you for your financial gifts for our general fund and building fund!

I am so grateful to be called to be one of your pastors. It is a blessing to serve here at Our Savior's. Day-to-day, while there are always challenges, it is a joy to be part of a congregation who is eager to grow in their mission and ministry. Let us stay faithful to our calling as the people of Our Savior's and trust that as we day-by-day live out those callings, God will use us to change lives with the love of Jesus.

There have also been difficulties that we have faced; grief and funerals, challenging conversations, questions about the future of the wider church. However, we can all find hope in the fact that no matter what we are going through, we walk it together as a church, always being led by the Holy Spirit.

One thing I would like to lift out from this last year that has brought me hope in my work has been the blessings of Confirmation. Each week we've been gathering with the largest number of students that have gathered here in years. Our program continues to grow as we see families seeking out ways to grow in their faith and in their community. I have been so blessed by the youth in our congregation and the wisdom and joy they give.

The Music Ministries at Our Savior's is an integral part of our Lutheran Worship. We recognize music as a gift from God so that people of all ages can participate more fully in their Faith Journey. Finances continue to be a constant challenge, but our faithful congregation met the demand and we ended the year on budget.

We also experienced staffing changes. Shannon Stuckey retired after 21 years of serving the church as Director of Music Ministries. We are so grateful for her years of leadership and service for our children and music ministry. Shannon wore many hats in her role, and after several months of advertising the position for one person, we revamped the position to be divided and were able to successfully fill the positions. In August, the Director of Music Ministries position was accepted by Tom Maidl. Caryn Nelson resigned as Church Business Administrator in October, and we welcomed Lois Aufderheide as the new Business Administrator in December 2023.

Wednesday after school LinC† attendance continues to prosper. Annual Report of Bishop Dee Pederson, SWMN Synod







For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.....

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. – 1 Cor. 12.

One of the great joys of my call is to visit the congregations across this synod. Our territory includes vast plains, rich agricultural land, hilly vistas, quiet lakes, and powerful rivers. God planted our congregations in cities, open farmland, and towns. We are very different from each other; yet in Jesus Christ, we all are one.

As we've journeyed together this year, we have been united by focusing on the WORD: Jesus - the Word-made-flesh, and the word of Scripture – as the source and center of our lives.

- **Embody the Word.** Synod Assembly 2023 brought over 365 voting members together in-person for the first time in 4 years! We rejoiced to sing again in Christ Chapel, passed the 2025 budget, and elected new leaders. And plenary speaker Matt Bloom helped us consider wholistic wellness in daily life.
- **Serving the Word Today.** Rostered ministers gathered for the Fall Theological Conference and considered how the Word is served (our calling to serve Christ) and how we deliver or serve-up the Word to people in our presiding and preaching. Presenter Jason Moore provided insights that can transfer in some way to all of our congregations, as we serve the Word both in-person and online in our both/and world today.
- **Living the Word Today.** Equipping Congregations Day 2023 gathered participants at Vinje Lutheran in Willmar to discover ministry resources from stewardship to hospitality to take back home. Luther Seminary Professor Rolf Jacobson led participants to look for the gifts of the Holy Spirit who is at loose in our world today.

Those actions - *Embody*, *Serving*, *and Living the Word Today* - provide the framework for reviewing this year and leaning into the next.

Embody the Word

Thank you for the way you, as beloved children of God, embody the word in your congregations and daily callings. You are engaging in ministry that is vital to the lives of your participants and the larger community. Although many of us are still exhausted from pandemic adaptations,

congregations are emerging from these difficult years with a clearer sense of who we are and what God is calling us to be and do today. The dedication of our church leaders to ministries of word and sacrament and serving, to compassion, mercy, and justice - has never been greater.

As we review the past year, one place to turn is the numbers. No, it's not all about the numbers, but trends do tell a story, whether in our households, businesses, or congregations. A synod's responsibility is to note the trends occurring among our congregations because these numbers represent real people, hearing the story of God's love in Jesus Christ.

The most recent statistical summary for congregations comes from the annual reports you completed for 2022. Of the 229 congregations in the SW MN Synod in 2022, 166 filed an annual report; 63 filed no report. When the annual report information comes to you in January, please direct the info to others in your congregation who can assist. Talk with your Church Council about the trends you are seeing. Return the form. And then know you have helped us reach a target of 100% responses this year! Thank you!

What stories do those figures tell? There is the cultural trend of fewer people connecting with a faith community. But these numbers also represent stories of outreach as adults are welcomed through Holy Baptism as hospitality is extended and new members are received, and as people are drawn to worshiping together both in the room and online.

Generosity

We know there is great generosity in our congregations! Although earned income for congregations was challenged last year everywhere, regular giving and other receipts increased. Over the pandemic years, many congregations held special appeals to upgrade technology – what a gift!

You have an impact on human lives every day. Each week in the announcements, try telling a brief story about one of your ministries. Share a photo on a screen. Thank people for their generosity and the difference they are making. If you are looking for resources to help affirm

your people's generosity, check out the synod website under the "Generosity" tab! (https://swmnelca.org/congregations/generosity-stewardship/)

Thank you for the generous Mission Support you shared in 2022. Although current 2023 figures won't be known until after the fiscal year ends January 31, we have seen a significant decrease in Mission Support this year. Why? We know that the cushion of PPP money is used up. Everything costs more. Some of our congregations' most generous givers are passing away or face high costs for elder care. And there is the tendency that when faced with financial challenges, congregations choose to direct funds close to home. Whatever the reason, we will continue to wisely steward the resources we receive and are committed to prioritizing providing pastoral care of congregations and rostered ministers. Like you, we know that challenges can also lead to doing things in new ways, and we trust in God's creative Spirit as we plan for the future. Thank you for your generosity.

If you have not yet sent in a Mission Support contribution for this year, will you please consider a gift yet in January? And if you have not yet returned a Mission Support Intent form for 2024, please do so. We are deep in planning the 2026 budget that will be presented at the 2024 Synod Assembly, and your planning will help us do our best planning, as well. Thank you!

Serving the Word Today

Thanks be to God for all the Lay and Rostered Ministers leading our congregations today. They are serving Jesus and serving the Visible and Spoken Word to people in worship in this synod and far beyond. Our synod includes 300 rostered ministers, half of whom hold active calls in congregations, specialized calls, and synod calls.



This year, we celebrated the ordination of 5 new pastors: Rev. Chad Duffy, Rev. Mort Meyenberg, Rev. Stefan Swanson, Rev. Bob Ossefoort, and Rev. Sarah Zender. We consistently

welcome more rostered ministers to this great synod than we see move away.

One of the greatest challenges for congregations and synods today is securing rostered minister leaders who can "serve the Word" in their context. Today, seminaries are seeing approximately half the number of enrollments they did 15 years ago. The good news is that congregations are embracing the gifts of their people and becoming less pastor-dependent than we were. The other piece of good news is that more lay leaders are sensing the Holy Spirit nudging them to consider part- or full-time ministry – often as a second career; and they are bringing incredible skills and life experiences into these new callings today.

TODAY, I pray that God will "send laborers" into this new and changing vineyard of ministry. My mentor, Rev. Dick Vangerud, often spoke of an initiative of our predecessor church body (The American Lutheran Church) called, "Men for the Ministry." Yes, back in the 1960s, the initiative was only about "men" for the ministry! But back then, congregations prayed that God would raise up new leaders. Pastors encouraged those they knew to consider ministry as a life calling. Since we can't grow pastors on trees, this is what I ask you to do:

- Pray in weekly worship and in your own devotions that the Holy Spirit would move hearts for people to consider part- or full-time ministry.
- Notice the people of any age in your church who might have the faith, temperament, and gifts for ministry. Affirm their strengths. Ask them if they might pray about and consider ministry in their future.

We are grateful for the ministry of Gifts of Grace that helps rostered ministers reduce the debt from their seminary training, and for the scholarships that are available from so many sources – including this synod, our seminaries, and the ELCA churchwide. Thank you!

For congregations who have rostered ministers leading you, please take care of them by providing appropriate compensation (see our synod compensation guidelines) and benefits. Encourage them to take sabbath time away from work and make use of continuing education growth. Got a concern? Talk to them, not about them. Give them a word of thanks for their ministry, which they serve 24/7.

Whether there are lay or rostered leaders serving the word with you today, strive to live together as the body of Christ. Nothing is more draining of leadership or destructive of Christian community than behaviors which tear apart the body of Christ. At the end of chapter 12, St. Paul tells the Corinthians, "And I will show you a still more excellent way." And that is the way of love - the way of Jesus.

Living the Word Today

These are interesting times to be called and sent by the Triune God to live the Word today! The territory of our synod is described by the state demographer as including areas that are entirely Rural, Town/Rural Mix, Urban/Town/Rural Mix, and Entirely Urban. "Cities, farms, and towns together." As demographic trends continue, the report asks, and we as the church can ask:

- How will we support the many older adults who are part of our communities who may live farther from services and family support?
- How will we respond to labor force shortages as more Boomers move into retirement?
- How can our churches help our distinct communities to be more attractive to new residents?
- How can churches make a difference in communities with growing racial and cultural diversity, and create connections and belonging?

Those gifts of the Spirit (1 Cor. 12) will lead the way as God continues to reform us to live the Word today.

This fall we celebrated the reactivation of our relationships with our friends in the South Eastern Diocese of Southern Africa. Four guests came to be with us here in Sept. -Oct., and then five leaders from SW MN made the journey to South Africa and were blessed by warm hospitality, joy in our friendships, and new opportunities to accompany one another in Christ. Another gift!

I am grateful for the leadership of our Synod Council, taking seriously its responsibility to be faithful stewards of our resources of staffing, facility, and funding. I am excited to work together with them on the Council's commitment to "empower Christian communities to join in God's mission of reconciliation: listening intentionally, loving unconditionally, serving others authentically, and faithfully healing creation." They have been focusing on the strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results they see in this commitment, and are eager to live out this vision with you in the coming year.





I conclude this report by expressing my sincere **thanks and gratitude** to the synod staff who embody, serve, and live the Word each day: Rev. Heather Culuris – Synod Minister, Tammy Schacher – Executive Assistant, Kristin Bakeberg – Communications Coordinator, Maggie Berggren – Administrative Assistant, and Rev. Dr. Troy Pflibsen – Director for Evangelical Mission. They walk beside you in ministry with wisdom and joy. We are grateful for the ministry of Youth Ministry Coordinator Rev. Nikoli Falensheck, who served with us for the past year. And we continue to grieve the passing of our colleague and friend, Pr. Naomi Mahler, who brought energy, courage, and faith to her many ministries and lived out + *SOLI DEO GLORIA!* each day.

Thank you for the privilege of embodying, serving, and living the Word together with you as the Southwestern Minnesota Synod, ELCA.

Dear Living Meadows Church Family,

We have turned the clock to 2024 feeling blessed for a terrific care team and happy residents at Living Meadows. We began 2023 with gratitude for our health, an increase in census and a return to a new normal in long term care. We saw fewer Covid infections among both residents and staff. Masking is mostly gone within our building, except during times of outbreak. Smiles among staff and residents have become our new normal.

Leadership stayed consistent in 2023 as we had no turnover among our leadership team. In March we welcomed Tacy Uhde as an Assessment Nurse to our leadership team. We also welcomed 31 new staff in all areas of nursing, dietary and housekeeping. We reduced our usage of staffing agencies greatly in 2023. All staff received raises to stay competitive with other health care organizations. We consistently worked on staff appreciation and to build a positive employee culture through staff celebrations, bonuses, and training. We feel very blessed to have a wonderful and dedicated team.

We made several plant improvements in 2023 including replacing some HVAC systems and adding a dedicated boardroom. We increased our curb appeal by resurfacing our parking lot and redesigning our landscaping in the front of our building. In the spring of 2024 we hope to also replace the lighting in our parking lot.

For the first time Living Meadows participated in "Give to the Max MN" and raised money for new benches and also sent a year end appeal. In total we raised \$11,000 between the 2 campaigns led by our Founders Fund committee.

ADULT MINISTRY TEAM

In 2023, the Adult Ministry Team continued working on ways to provide spiritual growth and fellowship for the members of Our Saviors.

Theology on Tap was held monthly at Schells Brewery and has continued to be popular. This is held the first Thursday of every month.

In early 2023, Adult Ministry hosted a Trauma and Resiliency speaker from Brown County with about 12 people in attendance. There was great conversation within the group and it was considered beneficial by those in attendance.

A Lenten study last spring by Adam Hamilton (*Jesus and the Outsiders*) saw about 6-10 people attending regularly. Also in the spring, a bread-making class was held with five people in attendance.

In June 2023, Adult Ministry hosted a trip to the Minnesota Twins game which was very popular. We were grateful to receive help setting up the visit from Luke Phifer, a son of the congregation, who is now working with the Twins.

In the fall, the team hosted a curling outing in Mankato which was attended by 12 people and well-received by participants. A fall bible study was split into Sundays and Mondays in an attempt to make it more accessible for those who couldn't make it one day or the other. There were about 5-6 people attending each day on a regular basis.

The team attempted to schedule a blood drive at the church twice in the last year, however, the Red Cross will only set up a blood drive if a minimum of 40 sign ups is reached and we were unable to reach that number. We will consider trying to schedule a blood drive again in 2024.

We also held our annual Camp Sunday fundraising breakfast in March. We served over 300 people. We had an envelope fundraiser during this time as well. This event is a great opportunity for our congregation to get excited about sending kids to camp and raise money that helps pay for bible camp. We would not be able to support so many kids without the help of our church family.

The Children's Team continued with an Easter Egg hunt in April! We had about 60 kids attend. Unfortunately, the weather forced us to hunt indoors and we are hoping to return outdoors in 2024!

VBS 2023 was in the beginning of June. There were 83 kids registered and 32 helpers! We spent the week discovering Jesus' STELLAR love! With plenty of space décor, great music, games, and bible stories, the kids had a blast! This year we moved VBS back to one session (versus two sessions that we did for Covid). It went well and we hope to continue one session in the future.

The Mission Ministry Team is responsible for directing Mission Funds donated by the congregation. In 2023, we distributed \$2,700.00 to these deserving organizations:

Everything is fully back to normal with our organization. The two events canceled in 2022 {World Day of Prayer and the Autumn Bazaar/Bake sale} were held this year. That was good news. We hosted World Day of Prayer on March 3rd. 33 people attended from our local churches. We had enough helpers for the apple pie and lefsa workshops to make the bake sale on October 7th a success. Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.




