Being good stewards of the generous support given the church is of the upmost importance to our team. While we will no longer print a magazine each month, the sharing and spreading of the good news continues every day...



ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission Presentation

We are excited to welcome Lucy Sletta to speak at worship on <u>July 16th</u>. Lucy will spend 2023-2024 in the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program. Lucy will tell us what she will be doing as a YAGM. Part of her preparation is to build support for her ministry, including financial support. Our *Noisy Offering* in July will support this mission, and there will be an opportunity to give on July 16.

Here is an introduction to YAGM from the ELCA website: "The ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program invites ELCA young adults ages 21-35 into a transformative, year-long journey in international service. As they offer themselves in service, ELCA young adults are shaped by the witness of our global neighbors. They share in the journeys of companion churches and organizations in one of nine countries around the world. A year of service through the Young Adults in Global Mission program invites young adults to become the hands and feet of Jesus in the world, providing critical support to ministries and projects in communities of need. It also invites volunteers into a journey of self-reflection, providing space to consider their sense of identity, God's work in the world, and their place within it all."



What is Young Adults in Global Mission?

The Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) invites young adults to experience fellowship in a life-changing way.

Participants engage with partners and hosts in one of **nine country programs**. Volunteers experience the transformation that comes from living among our siblings around the world. Participants serve in the spirit of accompaniment, which places an emphasis on mutuality and vulnerability as we walk alongside our partners. In an effort to counter the damage of colonial Christianity, relationships and listening are at the core of the YAGM experience.

In recent years, the YAGM program has sent around 80 volunteers into partnership annually. Volunteers are placed where their gifts, passions and skills best match the requests and needs of our partners.

YAGM requirements

- Young adults ages 21-35. A college degree is not a requirement.
- Connection to the church through an ELCA member, congregation or community; enrollment at an ELCA college or university; involvement in a campus ministry, camp program or event; or interest in the ELCA community
- A commitment to serving and building relationships with host communities
- Flexibility, curiosity, patience and a sense of humor
- · Emotional health and resilience
- Openness to exploring and deepening one's faith
- Willingness to learn a new language (in some country programs previous foreign language skill is highly recommended)



Our Savior's is again hosting a public collection box for the United Way "Stuff the Backpacks" Project drive!

From the United Way website:

Each year, approximately 400 backpacks are filled with grade and school district appropriate school supplies and given to qualifying children throughout Brown County.

What's the United Way Backpack Project?

Children in grades K-12 in Brown County who qualify for the free lunch program can participate in this program. United Way has teamed up with local school districts, The Salvation Army, The Koozie Group, Alliance Bank, area businesses, and places of worship to make this opportunity available to families in the Brown County area.

How does it work?

Each summer schools in Brown County mail United Way Backpack Project info and applications to families who qualify for the FREE lunch program in grades K-12. School supplies and backpacks are then collected by participating businesses and organizations to fill the large number of requests. Parents and children who qualify to receive a backpack and supplies are then invited to come and pick up their backpacks with all the supplies they need to get off to a good start in school.

Donations can be dropped off through July 26th and placed in the box in front of the church office.
